It's all in the telling of the story

Perhaps you recall the scene from Barry Levinson's classic movie "Avalon," the story of a Polish immigrant family's acculturation to life in America, where the extended family comes together for an annual, communal meal (if you never saw the film, perhaps you should put it on your must-see list)? In the overall context of the movie, the highly ritualized, recurring meal is only a pretext to mark the metamorphosis

of the family members' relationship with one another. That the meal was a Thanksgiving celebration is a nod to the film's attempt to universalize the American immigrant experience in the early 20th century. But this is clearly a Jewish story, and it strongly reminded me of my family's Passover *seders* when I was a child, complete with parents, grandparents, multi-generations of aunts, uncles, cousins, and others who might as well have been related, but who were definitely and permanently part of our

In honor of a Beth El president and father

The message this month is written in honor of the son of the fourth president of Beth El Congregation and the father of the current copresident. I call him Dad.

Marvin Manes was the fourteenth president of Beth El Congregation. When he was president there were approximately 600 families who belonged to Beth El. At that time Beth El Academy had almost 100 children.

When he was president both the Rabbi and Cantor had left and he was tasked with searching for new clergy. I recall him taking many trips to the Seminary in New York to interview candidates. At that point Rabbi Feffer and Cantor Berkowitz were eventually hired.

His life has been dedicated to Beth El. For example, he taught the 8th graders at Beth El a course on *Pirke Avot*. He was in charge of a fundraiser for the Anniversary of Beth El's Founding. For him it would have been

extended family. In fact, if you were to flash forward another generation, this scene could have easily been representative of the elaborate *Pesach sedarim* in our Los Angeles home as our two sons were growing up.

Why *Pesach*? What is there about the celebration of our ancestors' miraculous Exodus from Egypt that makes our Jewish and familial memories so potent? Is it the special foods we consume? Is it the unusual rituals that we perform during the *seder*? Is it the drama of the story that keeps us engaged in its telling and retelling? Is it the fact that we are commanded to relate this transformational experience to our children and our children's children as if we ourselves personally left Egypt—from slavery to freedom?

When our boys were growing up, Kay and I always had extremely large and elaborate *sedarim*. It wasn't unusual for us to remove all of the

regular furniture from our living room and replace it with one large, extended table that filled the entire empty space, to accommodate both family and friends. Typically, it meant weeks of preparation during which we designed an experience that would keep the kids interested, and offer the multi-generations of adults the possibility to engage with the text and enter into a discussion of the laws and minutiae of how to keep *Pesach*. It definitely meant cleaning, cooking and finding new and unique representative items that would creatively illustrate the ten plagues. It included the writing of a new play each year for the kids to rehearse and perform to tell the story of the Exodus during the "Maggid" portion of the *seder*, complete with costumes, props and set pieces. Of course, the meal was important—there had to be something unique that satisfied each and every person—but the experience of how we all related to each other in our retelling of the story was the ultimate goal. We successfully created indelible Jewish memories that filled our Jewish souls through planning and in the involvement of each participant at our *sedarim* and in the telling of our story.

Yet, each and every day in our liturgy, we traditionally recall the Exodus from Egypt as we chant *Shirat Hayam* (the Song of the Sea) in the Morning Service, as well as the references of its importance when we make Kiddush on Shabbat. It is one of the most important defining moments for us as a people, a catalyst from being B'nei Yisrael (The Children of Israel) to becoming Am Yisrael (The People Israel), with God-given laws and rules to be an independent people who are just, compassionate, and self-reliant. The retelling of this transformative event is the catalyst for our relationship with our past, present, and future. How will you tell your story this year?

MARCH 18, 2024 Dr. William H. Beyer

Dr. William H. Beyer, 94, passed away peacefully after a lengthy illness on Sunday, March 18, 2024 in Akron, Ohio.

Bill was born on March 8, 1930, in Akron, Ohio, and was the only child of the late Freda and Jack Beyer. He attended Crouse Elementary school and West High school, as well as the University of Akron, graduating with a Bachelor of Science in Math, and Virginia Polytechnic Institute, graduating with a Master of Science and PhD in Statistics.

During the 1950's, Bill was employed at Goodyear Aerospace (Statistician-Missile Reliability), at General Tire (Corporate Staff Statistician), and at The University of Akron (part-time faculty member). Over the years, he also served as a Statistical Consultant for area industries, hospitals, and schools.

Missing being in the classroom, Dr. Beyer embarked upon a successful accomplished career in college teaching and administration for over 40 years, initially returning to Virginia Tech for three years as an Assistant Professor of Math. He returned to Akron, Ohio, and had great success working for the University of Akron from 1961 until his retirement in 1998, serving as a Professor of Math Sciences for two years and then promoted to Department Head of Math Sciences in 1969, serving in that role for 21 years. Bill left the department in 1990 to become Associate Dean of the College of Arts & Sciences, leaving that position in 1993 to become Associate VP of Academic Support, then promoted to Associate VP, Business & Finance, and serving as Interim VP, Business & Finance for a short period until his retirement in 1998. He was awarded the distinguished honor of Professor Emeritus in 1998. Under his 21 years of leadership as department head, the academic offerings grew from undergraduate and graduate degree programs in mathematics, to undergraduate and graduate degree programs in mathematics, applied mathematics, computer science, and statistics. He touched the lives of many students, faculty, and colleagues and received numerous awards throughout his career.

Dr. Beyer was extremely well-regarded in professional services and dedicated much time to the Math Association of America, serving as the Ohio Section-Chairman elect, Chairman, and National Board of Governors, as well as the American Statistical Association, serving on the Review Committee for degrees of major US Statistical programs. He served as Editor of the CRC Press Publications used by students and scientists worldwide, including the Standard Math Tables (24th -29th editions), Handbook of Mathematical Sciences (5th and 6th editions), author and editor of the Handbook of Tables for Probability and

Statistics (1st and 2nd editions), and Standard Probability and Statistics Tables and Formulae. He co-authored a text with Dr. Sam Selby entitled "Understanding College Algebra." He also co-authored, with Dr. James L. Berk, M.D., articles in medical journals. He was a member of Sigma Xi, Phi Kappa Pi, Pi Mu Epsilon, and Omicron Delta Kappa.

Bill could often be found on the basketball court at the Akron Jewish Center and on tennis courts throughout Ohio. A natural at the game, Bill won numerous tennis trophies in his early years. He was Akron junior champ (singles and doubles) for five years in a row, runner-up (singles and doubles) state high school championship, participant in the U.S. Junior Tennis Championship, and a member of the national junior Davis Cup Team. Due to his love of the game, he was captain of the West High tennis team and captain of the men's varsity tennis team at the University of Akron, and later became the university's men's varsity tennis coach. He was inducted into the Akron Jewish Center Hall of Fame for Tennis. Later in life, he enjoyed the game of golf, playing on numerous courses across the United States. He attended numerous University of Akron football and basketball games with his family over the years.

Bill married Delores Stallings on September 6, 1959, beginning years of romance, travel, adventure, and raising a family. He was a devoted husband and father, and a generous giver of his time to others, sharing knowledge, advice and providing direction. After retiring, Bill and Dee traveled across the United States twice, stopping along the way to connect and reminisce with family and friends. He enjoyed reading fiction books, watching movies and sports, going to plays, working around the house, connecting with friends on email, and most importantly guiding, watching and participating in his children's personal and professional successes, and spending time with his grandchildren and the family dogs. He had many outstanding qualities and traits as a son, husband, father, grandfather, friend and colleague and was often described as a critical thinker, teacher and mentor, gentleman, man of honor, kind, and humble, all with a wonderful sense of humor!

Due to his long and outstanding service to the university and many years as a donor, Bill and Delores and the family established and funded the Dr. William H. Beyer Statistics scholarship and in 2015, the Dr. William H. Beyer Statistics Conference Room in the College of Arts & Sciences was named in his honor. Additionally, Bill and Dee established and funded two additional scholarships at The University of Akron, the William and Delores Beyer Veterans in Math Scholarship and the Kimberly A. and Delores Beyer Education Scholarship for Students with Disabilities. He was an active member of the University of Akron Retirees Association (AUAR) as well as Beth El Congregation, serving on several committees, and served as Chairman Elect and Chairman of the Board.

Bill was preceded in death by his parents, Jack and Freda Beyer and two uncles, Abe and Hy. He preceded in death his loving wife of 64½ years, Delores (Dee), by a matter of hours. This is the indication of the great love, relationship, and the bond they shared. He is survived by his son, Brent Randall (Ashley); son, Charles Kevin (Kim), and daughter, Kimberly; three grandchildren, Riley, Cara, and Ava.

Delores S. Beyer, 93, surrounded by her family, passed away on March 19, 2024, after a very brief illness.

She was born and raised in Akron, OH on November 6, 1930, and was the daughter of the late Stella and Dewitt Stallings. She attended the Akron Public School system; Betty Jane Elementary School and East High School (graduating in 1948). After high school, she attended the University of Akron studying early childhood education.

In her early career, Dee worked for Goodrich Tire and Goodyear Aircraft (Aerospace) as a secretary. She married William (Bill) H. Beyer on September 6, 1959, and moved to Blacksburg, Virginia for a short-time while Bill finished his college degrees and started in his first professional role as an Assistant Professor of Math. Delores was preceded in death by parents, Stella L. and DeWitt Stallings, and brother Douglas Roger Stallings. She was preceded in death by a matter of hours by her loving husband of nearly 65 years, William. This is an indication of the great love, relationship, and the bond they shared. She is survived by her son, Brent Randall (Ashley); son, Charles Kevin (Kim); and daughter, Kimberly; three grandchildren, Riley, Cara, and Ava; nieces, Diane Renee Musashi (Bruce) and Kelly (Michael) Novikoff and great nieces, Cara, Katie, and Sarah of California.

The sale of one's *Chametz* is an important component for traditional *Pesach* preparations. It is a symbolic affirmation of one's desire to follow the strict *kashrut* traditions for the Passover holiday.

The Torah expressly prohibits both the consumption and the ownership of *Chametz* during the eight days of *Pesach*. We try our best to eliminate our *Chametz* prior to the holiday as we clean and prepare our homes. This is the ideal, but the rabbis understood that it may be impossible to remove every speck of *Chametz*, so they established the custom of "selling" one's *Chametz*, called *Mechirat Chametz*. Rabbi Lipton will act as your agent in this transaction so you will, according to Jewish law, not own any *Chametz* that might be in your home. At the conclusion of *Pesach*, the sale becomes null and void and *Chametz* reverts back to its original owners.

The sale of *Chametz* must be completed by the morning of Friday, April 19. You may sign up in the synagogue office or use the form in the Bulletin.

It is also an ancient tradition to make a contribution for *Maot Hittim*. The words literally mean, "wheat money," and the funds collected would be used for Jewish individuals and families who require financial assistance at this time of the year. As you "sell" your *Chametz*, we urge you to abide by this *mitzvah* and make a contribution to the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund, which will be distributed to the needy.
