extraordinary and singular event that touched my humanity, but it also stirred my Jewish soul in unanticipated ways.

As a resident of Northeast Ohio, I felt very fortunate to be squarely in the path of totality. Unlike millions of others who had to plan, strategize, and travel great distances to be in just the right location at the right time, I was able to simply step outside and witness this natural phenomenon (with the appropriate eye protection, of course!). And, in my post-eclipse

conversations, everyone with whom I've spoken appears to have had the same powerful reaction, marveling, as I did, during that roughly fourminute period. Just as others have been eager to share their thoughts and reactions with me, here are some of my takeaways and reflections about this once-in-a-lifetime experience.

1. I was filled with awe and wonder:

- Witnessing a total solar eclipse evoked a profound sense "Yirat Adonai" (Awe of the Divine), a sense of wonder as I considered how miraculous it is to live a world that is both predictable and yet permeated with Divine Sparks and evidence of Creation itself.
- As I gazed at the sun when it was completely blocked by the moon, I was reminded of how miniscule humankind is within the grand cosmic tapestry.
- Moments like these filled me with a sense of humility and a deep and abiding appreciation for the structure and organization of the universe.

2. I felt a sense of oneness with others through this shared experience:

- Eclipses bring people together. Millions of people stood in and outside the path of totality and shared this experience, and yet, the data suggests that throughout the world, only 1 in 10,000 people will EVER personally witness a total solar eclipse.
- Communities gathered, strangers became friends, and people took the opportunity to acknowledge their interconnectedness.
- At that shared moment, we were able to block out many of the distractions that tend to separate

humanity, and focus more clearly on those things that we have in common.

3. I recognize that the eclipse provided additional data to feed scientific curiosity:

- O Scientists were able to advance knowledge relating to the sun's corona, the Earth's ionosphere, and even changes in animal behavior during the eclipse.
- The eclipse motivated us to deepen our understanding of celestial phenomena and reconsider our place within the cosmos.
- Data gathered during this event can create an impetus to strive toward additional exploration and fuel scientific progress.

4. The eclipse offered me an opportunity to look inward and strive toward personal renewal:

- The darkness that I witnessed during totality prompted personal introspection; I paused, looked inward, and contemplated human existence.
- O Just as the moon momentarily obscured the sun, I had the opportunity to reflect on the cyclical nature of life, the transitions that I have experienced, and the possibility of personal renewal that has come with each of those transitions.
- Witnessing the eclipse reminded me to not only observe change, but to embrace it and seek opportunities for growth.

5. I made time to appreciate the beauty of the natural world:

- The eclipse revealed the sun's corona—a powerful yet delicate, ethereal halo.
- It reminded me that I always have the capacity to appreciate beauty, even in unexpected places, and even during moments of darkness.
- I found myself inspired by the artistry and creativity of the natural

world, which led me to express my heartfelt gratitude.

6. I learned about myself and others through the process of preparation and the resulting anticipation:

- Even though I didn't have to travel to view the total eclipse, fully preparing for the event involved forethought, doing research, and careful planning.
- As the weeks, days, hours, and minutes approached, I reaffirmed the value of patience, the necessity of adaptability, and the joy of anticipation.
- The countdown toward the eclipse created a sense of excitement and reminded me to savor the journey.

7. I reminded myself that although life is filled with ephemeral moments, they can be both recognized and savored:

- Even though the totality of the solar eclipse only lasted a few minutes, the experience has left an indelible mark on me.
- O Like an eclipse, life can seem like a series of fleeting experiences. But if I strive to recognize those unique, ephemeral moments, I might discover that they are central to defining my life.
- The eclipse reminded me to seize the present and to create lasting memories.

Last month's total solar eclipse invited me to marvel, connect, learn, and appreciate the beauty of the world around me, to reflect on my relationships with others and with the Divine, and to briefly behold one of the great mysteries of the universe.

As I witnessed the moment, overwhelmed by all of these thoughts, I reined myself back in,

to acknowledge that I am intimately connected to a people—our people, the Jewish people—who have been gifted with traditions that express thanks and wonder each and every day through the blessings of our tradition.

At that instant, I said the following blessing:

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יי אֱלֹקינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלֶם עשֶׂה מַעֲשֶׂה בְרֵאשִׁית

Baruch atah Adonai Eloheinu Melech ha'olam, oseh ma'asei v'reishit

Blessed are You, *Adonai* our God, Ruler of the universe,

who makes the wonders of creation.

And I was grateful—grateful to be able to truly experience that moment, not just through my Beth-El-Raffle-provided eclipse safety glasses, but rather, through a vibrant Jewish lens!
